Reduce, Reuse, Recycle

Crow Canyon Road Widening Project - Alcosta Boulevard to St. George Road - Construction Begins Spring 2022

Large-scale construction of the Crow Canyon Road Widening Project will begin in spring 2022.

The Project will add one additional driving lane in each direction of Crow Canyon Road between Alcosta Boulevard and St. George Road, and includes improved facilities for pedestrians, wide green bike lanes, new vibrant drought-tolerant landscaping, and updated traffic signals and streetlights with the latest equipment and technology.

Minor construction work consisting primarily of utility relocation work is currently taking place. The original scope of the utility relocation work has increased as additional activities have been identified. This work is expected to continue through winter 2021/2022, with the road widening phase beginning in spring 2022. Project completion is anticipated to be the end of summer 2023.

During the widening phase, there will be major disruption to traffic, with lane closures and expected traffic delays. A construction speed limit will be in effect and enforced. Residents, commuters, and businesses will be encouraged to use alternate routes, such as Bollinger Canyon Road, to avoid construction impacts and minimize delays.








IMPROVEMENT SIMULATION – WEST OF ST. GEORGE ROAD * CROW CANYON ROAD WIDENING PROJECT

This fall, the Public Services Division completed annual sports field renovations at several park sites. Minor renovations at most sites are scheduled annually, with

the scope of work determined by staff. A typical baseball infield renovation consists of: verifying base anchor and pitching mound locations; assessing the condition

of the pitching mound and home plate and replacement, if necessary; straightening grass sidelines by trimming or adding sod, ensuring outfield grass is level with the playing field; verifying the radius of the infield arc; and adding sod to define the edge when needed. The need for replacement infield material at each site is assessed and added to maintain a safe playing surface. Sports turf is aerated, dethatched, after which seed is added, and then topdressed.

Spare the Air in the Winter

During winter months, the primary air pollutant is particulate matter. Particulate matter is made up of microscopic solid or liquid particles. Particles less than 10 micrometers in diameter can cause significant health problems. Fine particles measured under 2.5 micrometers, also known as PM 2.5, are considered the most dangerous.

During the cooler winter months, more than one-third of particulate pollution comes from wood smoke. On some days, wood smoke can account for up to 90 percent of particulate pollution in certain areas.

On cold, calm days, wood smoke can become trapped close to the ground by an inversion layer, typically formed when a layer of warm air acts as a lid over a layer of cooler air.

The Bay Area Air Quality Management District (BAAQMD) passed its wood burning regulation in July 2008, making it illegal to burn wood, fire logs, pellets, or other solid fuels in fireplaces, wood stoves, outdoor fire pits, or other wood-burning devices when there is a Spare the Air alert in effect for fine particulate pollution.

Now, a Spare the Air alert banning wood burning can be called for

particulate pollution yearround, especially when there are wildfires affecting the Bay Area.

Iron Horse Middle School Gymnasium – Floor Improvements

If you participate in any of the City's evening sports programs, you may be enjoying the newly refinished floor at the Iron Horse Middle School. The Iron Horse Middle School Gymnasium is part of the Master Use Agreement between the City of San Ramon and the San Ramon Valley Unified School District.

Per the Agreement, the District and the City share the annual maintenance costs associated with the gymnasium floor. As part of the routine maintenance, staff determined that the gym floor needed to be sanded and refinished for the following reasons:



- 1. The surface of the floor was being damaged after years of intense use.
- 2. Refinishing would extend the life expectancy of the floor.
- 3. The City's Parks and Community Services Department has received many requests for pickleball and badminton courts.



The District agreed to fund half of the wood floor refinishing and the addition of the new lane lines for pickleball and badminton. The City's portion of the project was funded through the FY 2021/22 Capital Improvement Program No. 925432 - City Facilities Floor Covering Replacement. The work was completed in August 2021.

San Ramon Redistricting Process Underway

The City of San Ramon is beginning the process of redrawing the district lines for future City Council elections, based on new data from the 2020 Census.

In 2019, the City of San Ramon undertook the process of moving from at-large elections to district-based elections for the Mayor and all City Council seats.

San Ramon's first District Election took place in November 2020, with the Mayor elected at-large, and City Councilmembers from



Districts 1 & 3 elected by district. In November 2022, the Mayoral seat will again be elected at-large, and Councilmembers from Districts 2 & 4 will be elected by district.

The 2022 redistricting process was initiated by the release

of 2020 Census block-level redistricting data.

Public input is key to the redistricting process, and the process will include four (4) public hearings. These hearings will take place at City Council meetings, and the redistricting process is expected to be complete in the spring of 2022.

Sandbag Stations

- 2) Athan Downs located on Montevideo Drive (nearest cross street is Davona Drive)
- 3) San Ramon Sports Park in Dougherty Valley located on Sherwood Way (nearest cross street is East Branch Parkway)
- 4) Fircrest Lane parking lot

The locations are marked with blue "Sandbag Station" signs inside the above-mentioned parking lots. Sandbag stations are self-monitored.
